The European Graduate Network (EGN) brings together graduate students of social sciences from eight leading European universities: the Berlin Graduate School of Social Sciences (BGSS), Berlin, Germany; Central European University (CEU), Vienna, Austria; European University Institute (EUI), Florence, Italy; Scuola Normale Superiore – Faculty of Political and Social Sciences (SNS), Florence, Italy; Institut d'Études Politiques (Sciences Po), Paris, France; London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE), London, United Kingdom; Universitat Pompeu Fabra (UPF), Barcelona, Spain and Institut für Politikwissenschaft at Universität Zürich (IPZ), Zürich, Switzerland.

The Network was initiated by students and has to date organized conferences in Florence (2007, 2015, 2022), Budapest (2008, 2016), Barcelona (2010, 2017), Berlin (2012, 2018), London (2013, 2019), and Paris (2014, 2020). The Graduate Network Conference aims at providing opportunities for doctoral researchers: to present their research projects, discuss methodologies, to practice presenting and discussing academic work. It encourages collaborative research of Ph.D. students from participating universities and aims at establishing academic linkages and cooperation across Europe.

The 14th European Graduate Network in social and political sciences is hosted at the Central European University in Vienna! Ph.D. researchers were invited to submit a paper or a thesis chapter to engage in a discussion of the work in progress and receive feedback from network faculties and peers. This year's conference consists of 9 panels covering different methodologies as well as heterogeneous fields: from political theory to political economy, from social movements to social and political behaviour, from governance and international relations to public policies.

We were impressed by the quality of the works we received, the availability of the discussants we decided to contact as well as of the network's representatives. 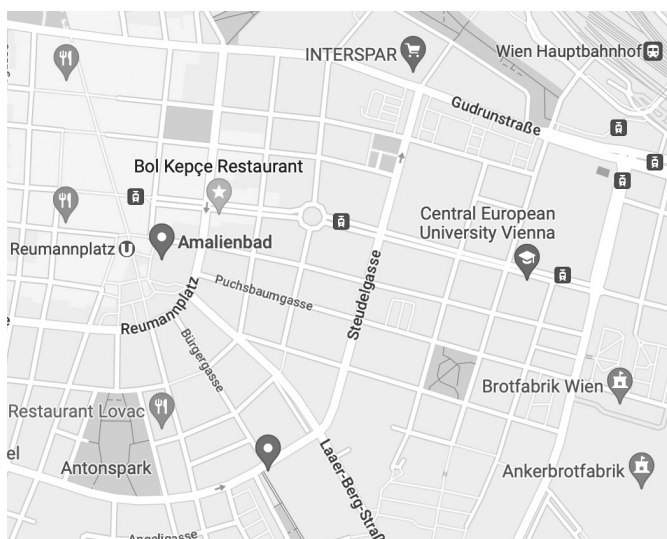

The CEU is closest to the U1 Metro line (Reumannplatz) and Tram 6 (Schrankenberggasse).

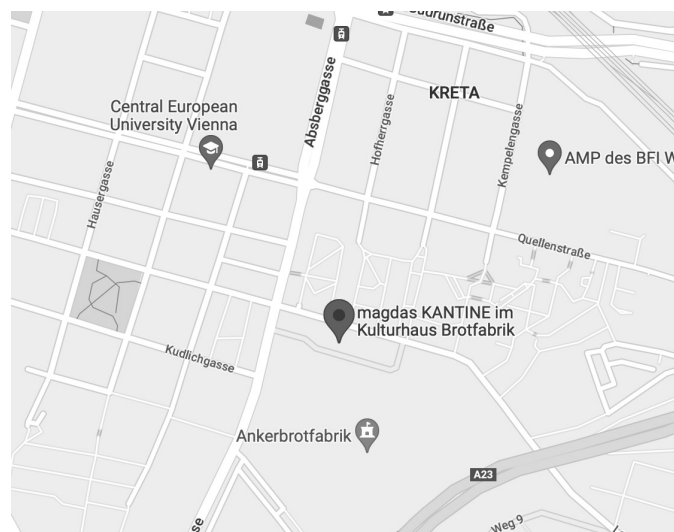


Ibis Budget Wien Messe
